KEY HIGHLIGHTS



In June, two minor internal asset damage incidents were recorded: One involved damage to a vehicle's tailgate while lifting a heavy pole, the other involved a severed fibre optic cable during trenching for a CCTV power line at Havercroft.

The two near misses involved fleet vehicles: The first was due to dogs running across the road, requiring emergency braking. The second involved aggressive third-party driving, which nearly caused a BWUA vehicle to have an accident while overtaking a slow-moving vehicle.

All incidents are being managed in accordance with BWUA's asset management and incident response procedures.



Encroachment remains a key risk. During June, encroachment report and notice templates were reviewed prior to formal rollout.



The switchover to the SafetyCulture platform took place in June. All security, facilities and fleet reporting systems are actively in use.

LIGHTS MAINTENANCE STATUS

Maintenance activities remain on track, with key workstreams progressing well. The **delivery of Clapham Motor 3A has been tentatively delayed** to October 2025, pending confirmation of the revised date from Actom. The **leaking mechanical seal on Havercroft Pump 1B is currently being reconditioned** by the OEM.

KEY HIGHLIGHT



Electricity remains the Association's largest variable cost. In June, pump station schedules were aligned to reflect Eskom's revised peak, standard and off-peak times.

These adjustments, together with an updated operating philosophy at Havercroft Pump Station, have already resulted in a noticeable reduction in electricity consumption.


RECENT MILESTONES

- Formal support for the OMMP was received from the Lepelle Northern Water Board; and
- At the Special General Meeting held on 6 June 2025, the Association welcomed new members and elected a new Management Committee, ensuring equal representation between Institutional and Commercial Members.

MITIGATING KEY RISKS

- Delays to OMMP Stage 1, caused by funding finalisation challenges, can potentially be mitigated through grant and bridge funding to be released by Members; and
- Cost and schedule overrun risks will be reduced through a fully wrapped EPC NEC strategy, Member-led project control and world-class control systems and resources.
